

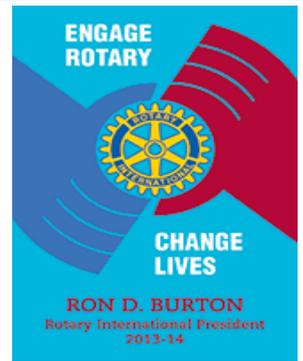

This week our guest speakers were Raymond Blessing and Juliette Goodall from TaskForce Community Agency. Raymond is the CEO and Juliette is the Art Therapist

TaskForce started 40 years ago and since 1973 TaskForce has provided specialist support for people in serious need in Victoria. The people who access their services have experienced significant disadvantage or a crisis in their lives and as a result are prevented from reaching their potential. Many have fallen through society's cracks and all too often have been placed in the "too hard" basket. They are people who have a long term range of complex issues or a single issue with a high degree of severity.

TaskForce core services focus on addressing social issues of addiction, unemployment, mental health and high risk taking behaviours; supporting their clients to transition back into "mainstream" services and supports. TaskForce assist young people, adults and families. Funding for TaskForce is primarily through Federal and State Government and Local Government tenders, plus other donations.

TaskForce vision is "*Giving life changing opportunities for those most in need*" and their mission statement is "*How do you get a second chance when often society doesn't care about you in the first place? TaskForce is committed to creating positive outcomes for people disengaged or living on the margins of the community. Whether they have been born into poverty and disadvantage, overwhelmed by a major crisis, trapped by addiction, mental health, circumstance or are simply seen by some as "too difficult to deal with", it is our goal to help provide them with the life changing opportunity to meet their full potential no matter how tough the circumstances. We never give up on giving people a chance to realise their true potential*".

Juliette told the club that through TaskForce's dynamic team at Moorabbin, they were able to establish an exciting Art Therapy program, which culminated in an art exhibition held at the Kingston Art Gallery, which showcases a wonderful exhibition of clients' work.

Ray said that with the help of Juliette she has passionately led the program and delivered great outcomes. Attached to this bulletin is the next Art Exhibition which starts with the opening night on the 29<sup>th</sup> May and then runs from the 30<sup>th</sup> May to 18<sup>th</sup> June.

#### **DAVID ANDERSON (MC, also presented on Youth Exchange)**

David joined the Rotary Club of Yea in 1994 and served as Club President in 2001 – 2002. From 2003 to 2006, he began his District service as Chair of the District 9790 Youth Exchange Committee. He was then elected to Chair Rotary Youth Exchange Australia (RYEA), a position he held until 2010. In 2009 he was appointed to a three-year term on the Rotary International Youth Exchange Committee and was Chair of that Committee in 2009 – 2010. An Assistant Governor in District 9790 for the two years 2000 – 2010, he served as District Governor in 2011 – 2012.

#### **MARK ANDERSON (ROTARY SECRETARIAT)**

Mark is the Senior Coordinator, Fund Development for the Rotary Foundation based in the South Pacific and Philippines Office in Sydney. He has been a Rotarian for over 25 years, being a member in Clubs in Victoria, New South Wales and South Africa.

#### **PHILLIP ARCHER (PUBLICITY, presented on Public image)**

With a very strong commitment to community service, Philip has had a major involvement with Rotary International for many years. **JOHN BOAG (ZONE DIRECTOR, presented on the expectations of a club president)**

John joined the Tamworth North Rotary Club, District 9650 in July 1980. Prior to that, his involvement with Rotary was as a member of Interact, attending RYLA and a GSE team member. John's Rotary service includes District Governor, International Assembly Training Leader, Regional Rotary Foundation Co-ordinator and member of the Constitution and Bylaws Committee. He was the Vice Chairman of the 2007 and 2010 Council on Legislation.

**MS KATE CARNELL AO ( Presented on aspects of mental health )**

Kate Carnell was appointed Chief Executive Officer (CEO) at Beyondblue in 2012 and has been a Director of Beyondblue since 2008. Beyondblue is a national, independent, not-for-profit organisation working to address issues associated with depression and anxiety. Previously, she was CEO of the Australian Food and Grocery Council and the Australian General Practice Network and is a pharmacist by profession.

**JENNIFER COBURN (RDU)**

Jenny is a Director and Treasurer on the Board of Rotary Down Under 2013 – 2016. Following her term as Governor of District 9810 in 2003 – 2003, Jenny has served Rotary in a range of roles nationally and internationally including a three year assignment as the Zone 8A Regional Rotary International Membership Coordinator.

**JESSIE HARMAN (ROTARY CO-ORDINATOR, presented on Zone Membership)**

Jessie has been a Rotarian for the past sixteen years, a member of the Rotary Club of Wendouree Breakfast in Ballarat. She has been active at both club and District level, having held many different roles, including a term as Governor for the District 9780 in 2010 – 2011. Ian H.S. Riseley is a practicing chartered accountant and principal of Ian Riseley and Co. Ian received an Australian Government's Peace builder award in 2002 in recognition of his work in East Timor. He also received the Order of Australia medal in 2006 for services to the Australian community. A Rotarian since 1978, Ian has served RI as treasurer, director, task force member, RI Board Executive Committee member, committee member and vice chair and district governor.

**GREG ROSS (DIRECTOR – AUSTRALIAN ROTARY HEALTH)**

Best known to Australian audiences as Senior Detective Tony Benjamin in Cop Shop, Greg has worked extensively as an actor, singer and master of ceremonies since graduating from the National Institute of Dramatic Art over four decades ago. In a second major coup for 2014, the Mordialloc festival has been selected by the Melbourne Food and Wine Festival to be featured as a “must visit” festival in its metropolitan event calendar. The mouth-watering selection of gourmet foods this year will include French crepes, Dutch poffertjes, ice creams, and Thai, Indian, Italian, Turkish, Greek, Spanish, Australian cuisines. A wide range of regionally made wines and boutique beer are also set to impress.

The music program is set to feature a fantastic line up of jazz and blues acts such as Deep Street Soul, Blue Shaddy, Kylie Auldish and the Glenroy All Stars, Jimi Hocking and Bert Deivert, and Andrea Marr and the Funky Hitman.

Other features include a free Master Chef's marquee, the Lens Mist photographic exhibition, and lots of activities for the kids. In a nod to Kingston's most popular festival, locally-based 2 Brothers Brewery are crafting a specially-made beer, Mordi Lager, for sale exclusively at the festival. It is said to be a clean, crisp, cold fermented beer that is pale in colour, light in body and delicately hopped.

The Mordialloc Food, Wine and Music Festival is presented by the City of Kingston and sponsored by Hocking Stuart.

The festival is on at Peter Scullin Reserve, Beach Road, Mordialloc – just a short walk from Mordialloc Railway Station.

This is a dog free, no BYO alcohol event. Entry is by gold coin donation.

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## Rotary International News

### The first four Rotarians

On 23 February 1905, Paul P. Harris, Gustavus Loehr, Silvester Schiele, and Hiram E. Shorey gathered in Loehr's office for what would become known as the first Rotary club meeting.

Harris's desire for camaraderie among business associates brought together these four men and eventually led to an international organization of service and fellowship.

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Read about each of the first four Rotarians below, and about Harry L. Ruggles, who is often called the "fifth Rotarian."

Rotary's founder, **Harris**, was born in Wisconsin, USA, on 19 April 1868. He was raised by his paternal grandparents in Vermont and attended the University of Vermont, Princeton, and the University of Iowa. He was Rotary president from 1910 to 1912 and a member of the Rotary Club of Chicago until his death on 27 January 1947. Learn more about the founder.

**Loehr**, a mining engineer, was born on 18 October 1864 in Carlinville, Illinois. He was a Rotarian for only a few years, never holding office at the club or international level. But that first Rotary meeting was held in his office, Room 711 of the Unity Building in downtown Chicago. He died in Chicago on 23 May 1918.

A Rotarian for only a few years, **Shorey** served as recording secretary during the club's first year. He was born in Maine in August 1862 and died in March 1944.

**Schiele**, a coal dealer, served as the Chicago club's first president in 1905 and Rotary International's third treasurer in 1945. Born in Terre Haute, Indiana, in June 1870, Schiele attended Terre Haute Business College and served in the U.S. Army during the Spanish-American War. He was president of the Schiele Coal Company from 1902 until his retirement in 1939. He and Harris became lifelong friends and lived near each other on the South Side of Chicago. Schiele died on 17 December 1945 and is buried near Harris at Mount Hope Cemetery.

Originally from Michigan, **Ruggles** was a graduate of Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois, and joined Rotary at its second meeting. He was treasurer of the Chicago club during its first year, president from 1908 to 1910, and a Rotary director from 1912 to 1913. He is known for having introduced singing to Rotary club meetings. His printing company, H.L. Ruggles & Co., printed the first issue of *The National Rotarian* and the first Rotary songbook. He died on 23 October 1959, an honorary member of seven clubs in addition to his home club, the Rotary Club of Chicago.
