Female Rotarians and female Partners of Rotarians who are interested in a mentor role should contact Chairman Peter Murie or for more information, one of the current Mentors listed in the handbook. The Foundation website formally explains the details of what is expected but to provide a point of Rotary contact and friendship is the most important task. The scholar can be an asset to the club and an interesting addition to the Club program.

The cost to Clubs is small unless the Club wants to cover the cost of the Scholar's attendance at the Rotary Conference.

The closing date for Outgoing Scholar and Professor applications is 31 July and so if Club Members are aware of suitable applicants they should refer them to the website or have them email the District Chairman.

HOST MENTOR RESPONSIBILITIES

Each Host Mentor is an important member of the Rotary Foundation team providing support for the scholar in the study district and a contact for the Scholarships Coordinator at World Headquarters. Host Mentor responsibilities begin before the scholar arrives and continue for the duration of the scholarship.

Your responsibilities include the following:

BEFORE THE SCHOLAR'S AWARD PERIOD:

- Correspond with the scholar and introduce yourself, your family and city;
- Assist the scholar in expediting the admission process;
- Assist the scholar in locating appropriate housing, especially when university housing is not available;
- Make arrangements to meet the scholar upon arrival. In your absence, please arrange for another Rotarian to meet the scholar.
- Contact the Scholarships Subcommittee Chair or District Governor to participate in your district's scholar orientation.

WHEN THE SCHOLAR ARRIVES:

- Present the first award payment from The Foundation to the scholar;
- Assist with budgeting and banking needs. Refer to your copy of the scholar's Amount of Award letter, which you will receive before the scholar arrives.

DURING THE AWARD PERIOD

- Work with the scholar to fulfill ambassadorial goals through
 - fulfillment of presentation requirements -10 to 15 visits to Rotary and non-Rotary groups per academic year (Cultural Scholars - 3 to 6 visits);
 - involvement in club and district service projects, or in a local Rotaract club;
- Invite the scholar to your weekly club meetings and to the district conference;
- Contact your Governor to suggest using the district newsletter to advertise the scholar's availability for speaking engagements and to publicize scholar activities;
- Encourage other Rotarians to share in providing home hospitality;
- If counseling a Cultural Scholar, visit the scholar's home stay location and meet the family;
- Remind your Academic-Year or Multi-Year Scholar that the first report should be submitted two months after the start of classes (Academic-Year Scholars also must submit tuition payment receipts). If these documents are not received by the scholar's coordinator in Evanston, the second payment will be sent to the host Mentor and held until this requirement has been met;
- Be available to provide advice to the scholar as questions or problems arise; encourage open communication;
- Remind the scholar who is considering remaining in the study country beyond the validity of the airline tickets that the Foundation should be contacted at least four

months before the end of the scholarship to allow time to provide required documentation and obtain approval.

- Remind the scholar to finalize return home travel arrangements with the airline at least two months before planned departure.

AT THE CLOSE OF THE AWARD PERIOD:

Invite the scholar to make a farewell speech to your club.

Meet with scholar to make sure that all necessary closing tasks have been completed (e.g. housing arrangements, bank accounts).

MESSAGE FROM RC OF MANNINGHAM – DROUGHT RELIEF INITIATIVE

Drought Relief Support for the Donald Friends & Neighbors Society

The RC Manningham has formed an association with the Donald Friends and Neighbors Society and specifically with local Uniting Church contacts Margaret Russell (Uniting Church Minister) and John Russell who are well respected leaders in the local community.

The RC Manningham initially provided a small emergency grant of \$3,500 to be used at the discretion of the Donald F&NS and followed up with members meeting with Uniting Church and F&NS to determine how the Club could best provide assistance to the community through short and longer term initiatives.

At the suggestion of the Donald community leaders, the following short term initiatives were conducted to raise the spirits of the community affected by three successive years of drought, and to show Rotary cares:

Easter Eggs for 460 primary and secondary students - in conjunction with Templestowe College and Templestowe Heights Primary School who raised funds to cover the purchase of the chocolate eggs and then delivered them to the Donald school children. (School to school friendship). Outcome - joy to the faces of many young children who had never seen the Easter Bunny (Templestowe School Chaplain Julie Ramsay who hired a costume for the occasion).

Toy Appeal - supported by RC Templestowe and Serpell's Primary School plus generous donations from all parts of the community, over 300 toys suitable for the 0 - 6 age groups are ready to be delivered to a newly renovated shop in the main street of Donald to establish a toy lending library for local families. Many Rotarian partners joined in the effort to sort and package the toys.

Mother's Day Gifts - Rotarian partners were again involved in a simple project to prepare 460 chocolate-filled, gift wrapped coffee mugs for school children to give to their mothers. The schools have not been able to run Mother's Day stalls for several years because of the drought.

The major longer term initiative is to use Rotarian professional skills to work with the Donald community leaders on a Community capacity building program centering on youth suggested by John Russell (Uniting Church), which would enhance their resilience to problems faced by adolescents in rural areas such as unemployment, drug and alcohol abuse, and parental conflict and assist them to redefine their self identity in a positive and sustainable way. The project will also work in unison with families enhancing the parent child family relationships.

Probably the most significant and unexpected outcome which has been conveyed to the Manningham Rotary Club by the local Donald community is that our Club's involvement has re-energised local support groups to work even harder to overcome adversity. Having external support, effectively a little extra weight behind the wheel has given everyone involved renewed enthusiasm; and significant personal satisfaction to all Rotarians knowing that their efforts are greatly appreciated by our friends in the country.

MESSAGE from RC of OAKLEIGH – DROUGHT RELIEF INITIATIVE

The Rotary Club of Oakleigh – District 9810 – was so concerned at the traumatic effect that the drought and bushfires were having on rural communities in Victoria, the Club Board resolved to provide some small assistance to affected communities.

A budget of \$ 20,000.00 was allocated - \$ 10,000.00 to assist Country Fire Brigades, and \$10,000.00 for Drought Relief Projects. Four country Clubs in each category were selected, and each was offered \$ 2,500.00 for distribution as each saw fit, with no conditions placed on the Clubs. The Rotary Clubs of Alexandra, Bairnsdale, Maffra & Mansfield – District 9820 – were selected for CFA Funding, and the Rotary Clubs of Hamilton, Horsham, St. Arnaud & Swan Hill – District 9780 – for Drought Relief projects.

At the Rotary Club of Oakleigh we were overwhelmed at the messages of gratitude and appreciation received back from these Clubs – the consistent message was the

gratefulness that someone in the city actually cared enough about what was happening in the country to offer assistance.

It is a stark reminder that in our urbanised environment most support services are situated in the cities, whereas most natural disasters occur in the country, leaving a great imbalance that governments are unwilling to address.

Having made this connection we are intending to continue next year to reinforce the city-country connection, and I would urge all urban clubs to consider such a project.

WORKING WITH CHILDREN CHECK (WWCC):

All Rotarians working with children who are under the age of 18 years, are required by law to have a Working with Children Check card on and from 1 July 2007. To assist clubs, application forms were sent to every President earlier in this rotary year.

So please ensure that every Rotarian and supporters of your club, involved in any of Rotary's Youth Programs (e.g. RYPEN, Camp Awakening, Youth Exchange, Bar-b-ques for schools or scouts) have completed an application form and send it off so they can receive their WWCC card and be able to legally work with children.

To date, over 40 Rotarians in District 9810 who have applied for the Working with Children Check have gained their WWCC card and, as Rotarians are volunteers, there is NO COST to the applicant.

UPDATE - SOLOMON ISLANDS - ASSISTANCE

Since the 2Apr07 earthquake and resulting tsunami in the Solomons, the following avenues for donations have been advised to District Clubs:

1. A RAWCS Project Number AP57/07 has been allocated to channel donations for the reconstruction efforts.
2. Shelter Box donations can be sent to RC of Hampton or to RAWCS Project 31/2005/6.
3. Donations for purchase of goods (not buildings) can also be made to District Rotary Foundation funds but, depending on the availability of District Designated Funds, Matching Grants may not become available from that source for over three years.

The Brisbane Planetarium Rotary Club is acting as the focal point for the reconstruction planning and Charles Guesdon, a civil engineer with experience in disaster recovery planning, is acting as the co-ordinator. John Lawrence who is a member of the Brisbane Planetarium Rotary Club and a RI Director Nominee has suggested that the RAWCS Fund be used for donations rather than the Rotary Foundation

Regular Situation Reports have been obtained from the Solomon Islands Disaster Management Organisation and these reports have been circulated to all District Clubs and to all interested Rotarians in Australia. The SITREPS give the best and most accurate information on relief and recovery operations and should take precedence over any media reports.

At present, there seems little sense in sending clothing, books, medical supplies etc to the Solomons. The supply chain to the Western Province is uncertain and there is a good chance that the items, well meant though they would be, may either be unsuitable or may never arrive.

Aid is flowing in from overseas Agencies and Governments and, from the DMO Sitreps, supplies of goods appear to be starting to flow into local shops. The best way to assist in the short term may therefore be to send money through the local Rotary Club in Gizo but check first by emailing Kerry Kennedy at divegizo@solomon.com.sb.

Long term reconstruction tasks will be allocated to the various aid agencies by the Solomons Government. There is no sense in sending reconstruction teams over based on a request, no matter how well meaning, from a 'local friend'. To do so will result in chaos and wasteful duplication of effort (even assuming that the materials required can be sourced locally). In the worst case, the team may be asked to leave by the Government. Charles Guesdon has also emphasised that most of the old building sites are heavily contaminated with asbestos and this material will have to be disposed of safely before reconstruction can start.

Peter Thomas, National RAM Coordinator, has suggested that Rotary adopt a 'wait and see' policy until specific reconstruction tasks are allocated by the Solomons Government. We do not expect this to happen until September or October: at the earliest.

This prognosis may seem gloomy or negative, but it is not meant to be. The local population has certainly been devastated by the disaster but assistance (both material and manpower) is being provided in a steady and logical manner. While progress in some areas may seem slow, there is no sense in rushing in with assistance outside the National planning framework. Similarly, there is also no sense in Rotarians impatiently rushing over to the Western Province on 'fact finding missions' as these people would just be another mouth to feed and another bed to find: both commodities being in short supply.

The recommended approach is to think with your head, not your heart and work with the Solomon Islands Government: it is their country.
