Last Week & Upcoming Club Program

Last Meeting (16/11):

This week our guest speaker was Leonie Moran who is a member and the past president from the Rotary Club Mont Albert & Surrey Hills (MASH). Leonie gave us a rundown on some of the methods the RC of MASH has used or is doing to improve membership and the everyday running of the club. The club currently has 45 members which includes 10 couples. The breakdown of the club is evenly spread with 50% female & 50% male members. The average age in the club is 50.

Following are some of the main points shared by Leonie during her presentation:-

- Focus is on Community Projects which also helps membership into the club.
- Keep a good profile in the community (regular BBQ once a week).
- Produce a community newsletter 3 times a year to highlight what the club is doing. 8,000 copies are printed and distributed around the neighbourhood.
- Provide show bags during the community festival which includes information about the club and Rotary.
- The club has strong leadership and planning programs.
- There is a rule in the club that no past presidents can be presidents again.
- Participate as much as possible in District Events.
- Have a membership and information night once a year.
- Weekly meetings are run for 45 minutes, and then followed by a meal

Koroipita's Stage II gets the nod

After years of documentation and planning the Fiji Rotahomes project team celebrated when NZAID approved the extension of the Koroipita Model Town in July.

NZAID's approval of the first six month budget phase, the first \$750,000 of a \$4 million plus grant, will extend the town, just outside Lautoka, Fiji's second largest city.



The Rotahomes project began in January, 1985 after three severe cyclones ripped through western Fiji, leaving hundreds homeless.

Project manager of the Rotahomes team Peter Drysdale saw the need to provide safe, cyclone-proof housing and has spent nearly 25 years since overseeing the building of around 800 Rotahomes housing 3350 people across a large area from Sigatoka in the south to Rakiraki in the north. This includes 80 homes at Koroipita Stage 1 which houses around 360 residents. The name Koroipita means "Village of Peter".

There is a kindergarten, office, shop and meeting room, playground, counselling room and nursery in the common area at Koroipita.

The village was built by teams of volunteers, mainly Rotarians from Australia and New Zealand, with most of the funds coming from Rotary clubs and Rotary International matching grants.

When word came through that funding had been granted, supporters were elated.

"We are delighted," said Drysdale, whose team includes two fulltime engineers and a team of community development specialists and local staff in training.

"The press of humans here is really cruel to see and it's very hard to turn people away who come to the village for help.

"We have pioneered a model for the legal structures to enable squatters to be resettled in our complex land tenure system.

"This is why we call it the 'model town'."

This is a term also used by government officials who recognise the strengths of the townships and see it as a template for a village on which

all housing for the poor in Fiji should be built.

While the houses are free, residents have to pay \$1 a day in town fees to cover garbage collection, basic maintenance, electricity for the communal areas and land rental.

With unemployment rising it is difficult for many families to come up with the \$7 a week.

The women in the village have a craft cooperative and sell items to an increasing number of tourists who visit the village.

Many of the men work in Lautoka and some will gain jobs building Koroipita Stage 2.

Koroipita Stage 2 will see another 160 homes built on 9.2ha of land adjacent to Koroipita stage 1. The extension is referred to as K2. This will raise the population to around 1100 people.

The first stage will see a huge community hall built. This will initially provide accommodation for volunteers who will start building at K2 next May. After the village is completed its layout will be reconfigured to a hall which will seat 400 people.

Once the drains, roads, sewer lines and other basic infrastructure are installed the first house will be constructed, continuing the work already achieved at Koroipita.

The huge improvement in the lives of the residents is hard for those who haven't visited to comprehend.

Many of their stories are heartbreaking. Some had lived on the rubbish dump, others were victims of unscrupulous landlords, some just never had homes, and were shunted from one squalid squatter settlement to the next.

One of the conditions of living at Koroipita is that the children must attend school, at least to age 14, but they are encouraged to continue longer and many are.

"Living at Koroipita is one-generational," Peter said. "We want to allow the children to be educated so they can gain employment and move out."

Priority at Koroipita Stage 2 will be given to families with young children.

"If we can educate the children it gives them hope," Peter said. "Only parents committed to sending their children to school will be considered and we provide financial and moral support to remove any excuses."

Before these families can be given housing there is a huge amount of work to be done. The initial \$FJ750,000 from NZAID for the first six months phase of the five-year program will establish surveying, town planning, engineering design and the first stage of basic infrastructure and utility installation and construction. The Environmental Impact Assessment is already complete .

Victorian engineer John Yalden and his wife, Emma, moved to Fiji in May to start work on the project, joining Australian Volunteers International

workers Ms Willy Heywood, Colin Schasser and Rebecca Beisler. Local staff provides accounting and support. The Town Clerk from Koroipita is now fulltime on the team.

The announcement of the funding was timely as the final volunteer team for 2009, from the Rotary Club of Brookvale, NSW, had just completed extending a house for one of the original Koroipita families and money had all but run out.

The Rotahome project has been under the umbrella of The Rotary Club of Lautoka. Past President Kamal Kumar said the planning phase of the extension to the Koroipita Model Town had been thorough so the infrastructure would be built to a high standard.

"The people of Lautoka and Koroipita are extremely grateful for this support from the people of New Zealand and for the contributions from Rotary International and the volunteers who have served at Koroipita.

"The city of Lautoka is becoming surrounded by squatter settlements but this model town offers hope for solutions."

New Zealand's Acting Deputy High Commissioner Todd Cleaver said, "Household income and expenditure surveys show that more than one third of informal settlement households live below the official poverty line and another third are at risk of falling below the poverty line in the event of a family crisis or increasing basic living costs."

The need for Stage 2 to be built swiftly is evident by the growing number of people who trek the dusty or muddy road to the village to see if a house is available.
